Know Your Numbers! March is National Kidney Month, an excellent time to learn more about kidney health. Go for your annual physical, and if you're not sure what everything means on your doctor's report, The National Kidney Foundation offers some help deciphering which numbers are especially important in predicting kidney health.

- Estimated GFR number: This measures kidney function. Over 60 is normal. If you're under 60, talk to your doctor.
- Blood Pressure Reading: High blood pressure leads to kidney disease.
 Normal blood pressure is 120/80. If the upper number is over 140 and the lower number is above 90, your blood pressure is too high.
- Albumin to Creatinine Ratio: Estimates the amount of protein found in your urine in a day. Protein in the urine is one of the earliest signs of kidney disease. Less than 30 is normal. If you're over 30, talk to your doctor.
- · Total Cholesterol: Over 200, you may be at risk for heart disease.
- Blood Glucose Check: This test checks for diabetes, the leading cause of kidney failure. A number over 125 (while fasting) or over 200 (after eating) indicates diabetes.
